FCSLA donates to swimming pool fund

A check for \$1,000 was recently presented to the Village of Brainard from Branch W16 of the First National Catholic Women's Association (FCSLA) earmarked for the swimming pool renovation fund.

"Our Brainard branch has been an active organization in Brainard since 1896 when Monsignor Alois Klein introduced the Czech Catholic fraternal group with the name of Catholic Workman (Katolicky Delnik #16) St. Ivan's branch," according to officers of the local group.

"On November 1, 2004, our branch merged with the

fraternal organization First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association connected with FCSLA life insurance and annuities."

Currently, Branch W16 has 152 members. "Our branch has been active in church and community activities, donating to and participating with the Holy Trinity PCCW and many other church events and projects, and to the Brainard community including the Brainard Community Club, the parks, street islands, the fire department, swimming pool, the American Legion and many other local needs," added the officers, who are Mary Lou Meister, president/secretary; Joyce Rezac, vice president; and Carolyn Dvorak, treasurer.

Brainard softball program receives grant

The Brainard softball program recently completed some updates to their field, including a new concession stand, cement work, and new bathrooms. With the recent construction, trees were removed in order to finish the building. The softball program coordinators applied for a grant to plant new trees at the field through the Ten Free Trees grant.

As part of the grant, East Butler Elementary and the Brainard softball program partnered with Great Plains Nursery and The Arbor Day Foundation to plant five new trees at the softball field. East Butler Elementary is a K-12 Tree Campus school and to extend the program, elementary students helped in the planting process. Students researched, planted, staked, watered, and mulched the trees in a fun-filled afternoon. With the help of Dave Foral, who dug the holes and donated mulch for the planting, the fourth grade students worked as a team to plant trees.

The Brainard softball program will continue its efforts at the park by continuing to plant smaller trees around the field and finish cement work. "It was really a team effort out there!" said organizers.

100 years ago in local history . . .

Brainard High fielded a football team for the first time in the fall of 1924. The team was coached by Coach Dolgner and finished with a 1-5 record. Brainard lost to David City 33-0, David City 24-0, Seward Lutheran 106-0, Ulysses 65-0, defeated Prague 24-0 and lost the final game to Schuyler 90-0.

A second game with Prague went unfinished when the team withdrew on advice of the captain and coach after having "concluded the referee was partial to Prague," according to the Dec. 4, 1924, issue of the Brainard Clipper.

Football was discontinued after the 1924 season and did not return to the scene until the East Butler district was formed and football was added in East Butler's inaugural year of 1961-62.
